## Envisioning the St. Paul's of the Future

The Vestry of St. Paul's is privileged to work on behalf of all the members of St. Paul's. Over the last 18 months we have been working diligently to help the parish emerge from the pandemic as a healthy community. In 2022 we invested time and energy in talking and listening with a large number of parish members to hear about your cares and concerns. With your help, we affirmed that our most important need is to feel a connection with one another. Many of us have worked to create connections through more fellowship events, return of community meals, food donations and distributions, Lay Listeners at all services, and articles and announcements to share what the Vestry has been doing.

At our annual Vestry retreat this spring, the Vestry started a comprehensive conversation about finances. The past two budgets have passed with planned deficits, meaning our congregational expenses outpaced our projected income. St. Paul's is fortunate to have reserves that can temporarily support these deficit budgets. While emerging from a global pandemic, it was prudent to pass these deficit budgets to continue the work and ministry of St. Paul's. Deficit budgets are not a long-term solution.

The Vestry is digging deep into understanding our current financial situation, looking at past years to understand trends, and looking forward to understanding our financial outlook. To guide our congregation into the future, the Vestry intends to embark on a strategic planning process that will set our course for the next 5-10 years.

Any strategic plan is only as good as the input we get from our community. Your voice will help shape the vision and path for St. Paul's. We NEED you! As we embark on this process, we are seeking to understand your hopes, desires, and dreams for St. Paul's. Our questions for the month of August are

### What hopes do you have for St. Paul's? In 2028, when St. Paul's turns 80, what will that birthday celebration look like? What do you want to see St. Paul's be (feel like) when it turns 80 in 2028?

We know there are challenging decisions ahead. As you are reflecting on these questions, consider all the facets of our congregation. This includes our services and how we worship, how we gather as a community, how we serve both our congregational and greater community needs, how we steward all our resources, including our building and grounds.

These questions are foundational to laying the vision that will guide us for the next 5 to 10 years. The mission of St. Paul's is "To live out the love of God as seen through Jesus Christ". This vision will not replace that mission, but shines a light on the path to bring that mission to life in our world. # Scripture Circle at St. Paul's - by Saoirse Charis-Graves

Recently, St. Paul's hosted a Scripture Circle for 15 participants. This form of study almost defies description, so most folks showed up with only a hint of what to expect. As we concluded, smiling faces, bright eyes and enthusiastic exclamations indicated enjoyment, excitement, and learning beyond what might have been imagined.

Our time together began by listening attentively to a word or a phrase shared by each person in the room, relating what we've been thinking about or wondering. Based on what was shared, several Scripture passages that might fit those questions or themes were suggested, and the group voted on where to begin with study. We landed on Genesis 50, which offers a story about Joseph and his brothers, the nature of family, and forgiveness.

Once we dug in, our facilitator — Rabbi Noah Ullman, a rabbi who travels both nationally and internationally teaching Scripture Circles — guided us through language roots and threads that run from Genesis 50 to other texts. Rabbi Noah warned us he would ask a lot of questions, questions that invite us to wrestle with our human experience and our relationship with God. The room was filled with exclamations, ahas!, and more questions. Every person participated, offering thoughts, stories, experiences. We even witnessed a spontaneous role-play between a couple of participants! There was gravitas but there was also laughter.

This is NOT your typical "Bible study!" This is an ancient and beautiful way of attending to the story of God in the Scriptures that is dynamic and responsive to whatever community brings forth in the moment. Personally, my life and faith have been revolutionized by this form of study, so much so that I am studying to become a facilitator myself. Scripture Circles can be as short as 30 minutes for kids to as long as a three-day retreat weekend. Generally, weekly Scripture Circles last 90 minutes, whereas monthly Circles are 3 hours in length. Some are held in many different places, including outdoors. Some Circles are held online, with participants from across many locations. Cost varies according to the experience of the teacher, and is usually offered on a sliding scale of paying what you can or are able to pay.

As I understand it, Scripture Circle is best summarized as *"journeying together in sacred community, guided by the Holy Spirit, grounded in God"*. I hope to bring Rabbi Noah back to St. Paul's in the future. Perhaps I'll see you there!



Deep gratitude to all the folks who participated in Adult Faith Exploration this year. We've shared questions, prayers, curiosities, book titles, websites, inspiration, joys, and occasional challenges. We've welcomed some new folks and enjoyed the stimulation of guest speakers and facilitators. We've explored the boundaries of what we think we know as well as some new practices for engaging with our faith. All while creating a sense of community in the name of deepening our relationship with God.

We'll miss one another this summer, and we'll return in September with new vigor for continued study and exploration. Thank you to everyone!

# An Invitation to Learn More about How Listening Can Strengthen a Caring, Connected Community

Those of us who have been deeply involved in learning about empathic/ deep listening hold it as a foundation to developing the caring, connected community the St. Paul's congrega-

tion is longing for. We believe *The Listening Life* by Adam S. McHugh captures the concept in a way that is both intellectually and spiritually supportive of our church mission. Each of the Vestry members has read the book and participated in development of the basic skills and practices while connecting with members of our church community. We would like to extend an invitation to all in the congregation to enjoy the same spiritual lift and excitement. We have begun discussion about how to accomplish that.

**Outreach** continues to work on supporting organizations in Lakewood and the greater Denver area. The first half of the year, support was given to charities in Lake-

wood. For July and August, the loose plate is going to **Clothes To Kids**, a metro based organization that provided clothing the children in need throughout the ten metro counties. This includes families at risk, children in foster care, immigrants and refugees. The focus of providing outfits is for school age children, from 3 to 21. It helps young people trying to complete their GED. When a child visits, they are allowed to shop the store and each child leaves with twenty-one pieces of clothing, their own wardrobe. Clothing includes underwear, socks, shoes, tops, pants, and a coat.

Since the founding of Clothes to Kids fifteen years ago, more than one-hundred thousand wardrobes have been provided. In addition to the loose plate, Outreach is collecting socks and underwear. There are collection bins in the narthex. All sizes from children's XS to adults XL are welcomed. Thank you for your support of this organization.

# **Adult Faith Exploration**

Make me to know your ways, O Lord. Teach me your paths. (Psalm 25:4)

This offering has gone by a number of names at St. Paul's. Adult Sunday School. Adult Faith Formation. In recent years, we have been using the name: *Adult Faith Exploration*. Why? Because our **faith** unfolds and deepens as we **explore** scripture, listen to the weekly sermons, and reflect with one another on the meaning of what we are experiencing in our daily lives.

Faith exploration is the lifelong process of growing in our relationship with God, self, others, and all creation. Every experience in our lives can provide us with the opportunity to express our faith. The challenge we face is recognizing these opportunities and learning ways to live a sometimes countercultural life in a secular world.

At St. Paul's, we study individually and together, dive into our weekly readings, and learn about the foundations of our traditions. Together, we question how we can do more to live out God's mission in our parish community and in our communities outside the church doors. We might read a book, engage with a devotional, view interviews/videos with authors and scholars, or dive into a theological reflection on challenging questions such as "Is the God I believe in the same God you believe in?"

In these challenging times, we are being asked to "double down" on what we believe and in our commitment to a just world, including our commitment to creating God's "beloved community." This is hard, and it is important that we do this work of discernment together.

We offer weekly sessions on Sunday mornings at 9:15 in the church library from September-May. All are welcome to attend!


