It was pretty incredible to see folks in church in the flesh on Pentecost. I know Pentecost is supposed to be all about the Spirit, but bodily presence - your bodily presence - in our worship space is a powerful force for witness to what that Spirit is actually doing in our lives.

We spend a lot of time in witness whether we know it or not. Where we spend our time and how we spend it has always been an indication of our spiritual priorities. We've all known that. But the last year has exposed a real spiritual dilemma. That is, what do we do when our deepest spiritual practices and connections are blocked? How do we respond then? What will we do in place of going to church or volunteering at a community meal, or whatever other thing our hearts feel called to? The answers, as we've seen, do not come so readily as we would like.

There is always a reason to choose something different than what is most important to our deepest convictions. The pandemic was/is real and scary and we cannot just go along with a business as usual approach – even to our spirituality. It's nice to be getting back to worship in person, but we are still a spiritual people who have to make decisions about our time and our gifts. The decisions we make are tied to how we view ourselves as spiritual people. And the defining question may be, "Am I defined by notions and fears of scarcity, or is my approach to life informed by my understanding of myself as a recipient of God's abundance?

In the early, frantic days of the pandemic and isolation, I was defined almost solely by fears of scarcity. No people in church. Facebook and YouTube felt like a poor substitute for communal worship. Preaching was stilted and uncomfortable. No communion. No singing. The mantra of "no this and no that" seemed to be defining my life.

We all have days when we fall into stories of scarcity. We become the main characters in a movie about unmet needs set in a barren landscape. Those days are not the days to get down on ourselves for not being grateful enough. They are the days to slow down and take notice of how assuming the role of victims of scarcity can undermine our own spiritual well-being. (Just for the record, there are times of real scarcity and sometimes unmet needs become dangerous to our health. But I'm not talking about that).

I am not sure that it is possible to go through life without ever feeling like a victim of scarcity, but I do know that spiritual practice is a way to keep from allowing stories and fears of scarcity to define who we are. A daily practice of prayer and a moment by moment practice of noticing blessings and beauty have always been the best ways to remain a student a God's abundance. This is an important commitment for us as a people. And staying in touch with abundance as a reality to build our lives on is key to our health as a community and the vibrance of our outreach efforts. If we do not think our individual attitudes about abundance and scarcity matter, then we need to reconsider how important each of is to the work and witness of our parish.

Scarcity is a dark story that does not allow space for hope or growth. The problem is that stories of scarcity are easier to tell because they seem to rise to the surface. Noticing and witnessing to abundance takes practice and a has to become an intentional part of our lives so that it does not get lost – so that WE do not get lost.

As we are rebuilding on our bodily presence in worship, now is the perfect time to begin to reclaim and to reshape our lives in terms of God's abundance and all the blessings God has given us. That reclaiming and reshaping might be the most important work of spiritual growth we take on for the foreseeable future. In fact, our future may depend on it. The future of St. Paul's and our mission and ministry are based on God's abundance. As long as we have breath in us, that needs to be the only story we tell.

FOOD DISTRIBUTION DONATIONS NEEDED ON 2^{ND} AND 4^{TH} WEDNESDAY AFTERNOONS

In place of the weekly donations for the Action Center we are accepting donations for our biweekly food distribution. On the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays St. Paul's is a Food Bank of the Rockies Mobile Pantry. The FBR brings a semitruck to our parking lot early in the morning and we unload it, organize the food and hand it out. To supplement this and for people who can't make it in the morning we also have food distribution on 2nd and 4th Wednesday afternoons. For this we get some food from FBR and some from Benefits and Action. We have been adding to these two sources with donations we get from the congregation. Please leave your donations in the cooler in front of the church from 3:00 until

4:30 on the days of food distribution. Here are the donations needed for June and July:

June 9: desserts (must be packaged desserts, sorry, no home-made)

June 23: Breakfast bags (a complete breakfast including milk and juice)

July 14: Salad kit and rolls (preferrable salad kits with dressing)

July 28: Kid favorites (hot dogs or hamburgers, buns, potato salad or coleslaw and chips)

The strong support of one another is the key to success in those situations.

The Vestry has started work on updating our bylaws. Some of the language is outdated and St. Paul's has changed a bit since the last revision. Thanks to David Ebner for chairing this committee. The proposed changes will be brought to the congregation for approval when the work is complete. It's a very thoughtful and slow process so please be patient.

Youth Works returns this summer and will be filling our building with young people. Beginning in early June through the end of July, we will have 60 or so teens sleeping and eating in our building.

It is exciting to get back to work – and to be able to see our friends once again in person! We are coming alive again! Praise God!

Stewardship Ministry Update

Why Stewardship Ministry and who do we serve?

The mission of the Stewardship Ministry at St. Paul's Episcopal Church is to discern, develop and implement a Stewardship Formation that spiritually moves the congregation to understand, support and celebrate the use of our parish resources to accomplish our church mission. The church's mission, in a sense, is to "care for the people entrusted to us by God." (1) We do that at St. Paul's by living out the love of God as seen in Jesus Christ. Moreover, we are affording those people entrusted to us by God a way for spiritual growth as they seek redemption through Jesus Christ and reconciliation with God and each other.

What is Stewardship?

Broadly speaking, stewardship is the "utilizing and managing the resources that God provides for the glory of God and the betterment of His creation."(2) Those resources include our time, our skills and talents as well as our financial resources that we contribute to do God's work and give back some portion of the gifts God has given us.

Your gifts at work!

This past year has been a significant challenge for all who are engaged in the various ministries as St. Paul's. We must thank the leaders of each of the ministries and the volunteers recognizing the initiative and creativity they demonstrated in continuing to serve people in need.

The Feeding Ministry adjusted to the pandemic restrictions on gathering for meals by partnering with the Food Bank of Colorado and Benefits In Action to distribute food to those in need. As a result, the ministry provided nutritious food for thousands of people in our community throughout the year. The Youth Faith Formation has continued to provide a Christian education opportunity by converting its gatherings to an online format and many young people have benefited during a stressful time for them and their families. The Pastoral Care Ministry has continued to provide comfort and care to those in need even though many times it depended on phone calls and meetings online in place of in-person contact. The Outreach Ministry has distributed funds to ministries and causes outside the church that were previously benefitting from our plate offerings These are but a few examples of how your contributions have ensured St. Paul's continued to accomplish its mission. Thank you!

Financial overview

In terms of stewarding the financial resources of the church, it has been no less difficult over the last year. Our Pledge Drive last Fall yielded significantly less than previous years. The interim budget for the first half of the year was shared at the parish meeting early in the year. The income we would have gotten from organizations that use our church for meetings and training sessions did not occur. On the positive side, we were able to obtain a Payroll Protection Plan forgivable loan that helped offset some of the shortfall in gifts and other income. Unfortunately, we have not been able to fill vacancies in important parish roles due to scarce resources. The Vestry, with excellent guidance from the Finance Committee, has been quite diligent in monitoring the income and expenses of a reduced budget the first half of the year. With the lessening of COVID19-related restrictions we are looking forward to regaining some of the income from use of our building in the second half of the year.

The Stewardship Ministry has defined its plan and goals for the year as part of the training mentioned above. We will continue to communicate in the Weekly Newsletter with scripture, inspirational thought and updates on our activities through the rest of the year. As always, we appreciate your input.
